Arroyo Colorado Education and Outreach Workgroup Formed Under The Arroyo Colorado Watershed Steering Committee

Meeting Summary – November 8, 2005

CALL TO ORDER/WELCOME/INTRODUCTIONS

Laura De La Garza called to order the eleventh meeting of the Education and Outreach work group at 5:15 pm. The meeting was held in Classroom 157 of the Texas A&M Agricultural Research and Extension Center in Weslaco, Texas. Video conferencing was established with the TCEQ offices in Austin, Texas.

Introductions were made and Laura informed the group that the summary notes for the previous meeting would be sent out for comment. Next Laura referred to the agenda for the list of recent outreach efforts. Susan asked what kinds of responses are received from the presentations. Laura discussed recent presentations to groups in McAllen and Edinburg and stated that the presentations are well received with lots of interest in project; that often new members are recruited who want to be kept informed of the progress.

Laura stated that at the presentation in Edinburg, one citizen contented that there are no more colonias in the valley. Roger stated that the current law prohibits new colonias unless there is proper infrastructure and that the TWDB maintains a list and website for existing colonias in RGV through 2003.

Paul asked about colonias in his neighborhood and asked how many houses are required to be considered a colonia (ex. 5 houses). Roger stated that there are colonias near Los Fresnos, and within the CCN area around Weslaco, Donna, Mission, McAllen, Alamo and Progresso.

Laura stated that during her presentation to the McAllen Rotary Club, someone asked about the Harlingen weir/aeration project and that she informed the group of the current status; that the USACE general permit was granted, and 2 years earlier, the preliminary IBWC permit

(hydraulic) had been issued. Licensing through the IBWC is the next step. There was question if the weir project is part of WPP and whether it should be incorporated into the E&O part of the plan. Don Hockaday stated he heard that the weirs would be ineffectual, but supports it if not hurting anything. He asked Roger if the TCEQ would support it. Roger stated that there was no supporting documentation and that if TCEQ were to support it, data would be needed. In regards to the weir structures near Mercedes, no long range effects on DO levels have been demonstrated. Paul stated that even though we don't have technical data, their efforts should be applauded. The work group favored the project and agreed that it should be incorporated in the WPP. TCEQ does not oppose and the Arroyo Partnership can support despite TCEQ position.

NRS Engineering has not provided any technical analysis on the amount of aeration from weir structures. Laura expressed concerns over potential habitat destruction but agrees the project should be supported as it could help with aesthetics. A small lake might be created making it a positive place to recreate. Laura stated that NRS is open to design suggestions to address concerns. It was suggested that this project be added as an agenda item for the Steering Committee and discussed as whether the weir/aeration project should be incorporated in to the WPP. The Valley Sportsman, the Port of Harlingen, and the City of Harlingen were identified as long time supporters.

Karen Ford identified the opportunity for feedback from Laura's presentations to groups. She stated that they could create a post-presentation survey (5-6 questions) to get public response and ideas on what the general public can do.

Signage throughout the watershed was proposed to let citizens know they are in the Arroyo Colorado (AC) watershed. Signs could be placed every time a roadway crosses the AC watershed. Signage could be pre-tested during the focus groups.

Susan asked if there was a general lack of awareness or lack of awareness concerning the remediation efforts. The answer is both and that this is something that can be quantified in the survey. The reason for the impairment is complicated, part education, what it is, what the roles are, why it is important, and why it needs to be repaired. Don stated that if the AC meets the criteria, it will be good for fishing and birding. Paul reminded the group that the AC's effect on the Lower Laguna Madre (LLM) is important to highlight as we will get more attention if talk about the LLM vs. the Arroyo. Important message to test: the effect and importance of the AC on the LLM. Don suggested that another message be tested: the AC is the watershed and not just looking at a stream.

There was question as to whether or not dramatize the issue of bacteria; again, something to be tested in the focus group meetings.

Susan asked who the primary audience is. Voters were identified. What is the biggest problem and who do we need to address? It was earlier stated that the TCEQ needed help in compliance issues. Once the problem is identified, can come up with a solution and this will dictate action. What and who are the priorities? Karen suggested focusing on the influencers and then come up with a plan.

REVIEW OF WORKPLAN

Next the attached two page work plan was discussed. As part of step one, the group focused on developing a list for the one-on-one interviews. Ultimately, the consultants will conduct 20-25 one-on-one interviews with key community stakeholders and/or influencers in the region. The
